FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

It's been a season of challenges and opportunities, and I'm pleased to provide an update on the work we've been advancing on your behalf.

Thank you to all residents for your continued water conservation efforts as we navigate prolonged drought conditions and develop both short-term and long-term solutions to the issues. To better understand the challenges, I joined City staff on a watershed tour last month of the Kiskatinaw River and Bearhole Lake. Seeing the conditions firsthand underscored the urgency of advancing the <u>Dawson Creek Water Supply System Project</u>, which proposes a new water line from the Peace River to deliver a long-term, reliable supply.

While securing our water future has been a top priority, Council's work extends across many areas of advocacy and community connection. Earlier this month, I attended an interprovincial meeting as a PRRD Director, where leaders gathered to discuss shared challenges such as mental health, solid waste management, highway twinning, rail opportunities and ecological corridors. These conversations are critical for ensuring our region's needs remain a focus at both the provincial and interprovincial level.

At home, I hosted another Seniors Roundtable, which continues to be a valuable way to update seniors on City projects while also hearing their perspectives and concerns. We also welcomed BC's Minister of Forests, Minister Parmar, on his first visit to Dawson Creek, and I connected with MLA Larry Neufeld and colleagues at a community meet-and-greet - strengthening relationships to support Dawson Creek's long-term goals.

Council and I will continue to keep you updated on our work - from tackling water security to advancing projects that shape Dawson Creek's future. As we look ahead, I'm excited for the joyful sights and sounds of the holiday season that bring our city together in such a special way. Wishing you health and happiness as we close out 2025.

COUNCIL CORNER

It's been a busy start to the Fall season! In September, Mayor Dober and Council attended the annual Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) Convention in Victoria, joining local governments and First Nations from across the province. The convention gives municipalities the chance to bring forward resolutions, meet directly with provincial and federal ministers, and strengthen partnerships with other communities.

A key moment for Dawson Creek was advancing our sponsored resolution calling for rural crime prevention officers. This initiative, which received strong attention, would help improve communication between rural RCMP detachments and local crime prevention organizations - a practical step toward safer communities across the Peace Region and beyond.

Council also received updates from the federal Minister of Housing and Infrastructure and heard directly from Premier David Eby, who emphasized the importance of the BC Northeast as the province's economic engine and highlighted the need to support resource industries.

Throughout the week, Council met with numerous ministries, including Health, Finance, Energy and Climate Solutions, Environment and Parks, and Emergency Management, as well as Northern Health, rural communities and resource investors. These meetings allowed Council to strongly advocate for Dawson Creek's priorities - from healthcare and education to resource development and community safety.

As we carry this momentum forward, Council remains committed to advocating for Dawson Creek and delivering on the priorities that matter most to our residents.

IN FOCUS



Securing Dawson Creek's Water Future

Dawson Creek has now entered its fourth year of prolonged drought, with water levels in the Kiskatinaw River - the City's current water source - at historic lows. In past years, releases from Bearhole Lake provided relief, but the lake is no longer recharging, leaving no supplemental water available. With warm, dry weather persisting, Dawson Creek must now rely heavily on stored reserves.

To stretch those reserves, Council moved the community into <u>Stage 3 Water Conservation Measures</u> effective September 11, 2025. These measures are essential to ensure the City can meet demand through the winter months.

At the same time, Dawson Creek is pursuing both short-term and long-term solutions, including advancing the <u>Dawson Creek Water Supply System Project</u>. A near-term plan is in development and will be shared later this fall. The long-term solution - a new water line from the Peace River - is already advancing through the early stages of the <u>provincial environmental assessment process</u>.

Ensuring a secure and sustainable water supply is the City's top priority and we are committed to building resilience against drought. Residents and businesses are asked to continue conserving wherever possible to help protect our community's future water supply.


2025 Capital Projects: Building a Stronger City

With phased exemptions of up to 10 years, the bylaw supports a vibrant downtown and new residential, commercial and industrial development.
